THE EMOLUMENTS AND BENEFITS OF THE PRESIDENT, VICE PRESIDENT AND PRIME MINISTER BILL, 2009.

MEMORANDUM.

- The object of this Bill is to repeal and replace the Presidential Emoluments and Benefits Act, Cap.263; to provide for the salaries allowances, retirement benefits and benefits of spouses and dependent children of Presidents and Vice Presidents ceasing to hold office and in particular to provide for the office of Prime Minister arising out of the formalisation of the office of Prime Minister by the Constitution (Amendment) Act, 2005 (section 30 introducing article 108A of the Constitution). Article 108(6) of the Constitution applies to the Prime Minister with necessary modifications the provisions of article 108(6) relating to the Vice President's emoluments.
- The Bill seeks to improve on the terminal benefits of the President and to introduce terminal benefits for the Vice President and the Prime Minister which were previously not provided for under the existing Act.
- The Bill provides for the purchase of health insurance policy for a retired President and his or her spouse and provision is made for house purchase for the retired President and the Bill makes provision for payment of survivors' benefits to a surviving spouse or spouses of a retired President until his or her or their demise.

- 4. Similar provision is made in respect of the Vice President and the Prime Minister.
- 5. Provision is also made for dependent children of a deceased President, Vice President and Prime Minister.
- 6. The Bill further provides for benefits to be awarded to a President, Vice President and Prime Minister who is removed from office for incapacity of body or mind.
- 7. The Bill provides for funeral benefits for a President, Vice President and Prime Minister who dies while in office.
- 8. The Bill provides that the benefits are to be reviewed after every five years taking into account the changing social and economic circumstances.
- 9. According to clause 30 of the Bill clauses 2, 3 and 4 of the Bill apply only to a President, Vice President and Prime Minister under the 1995 Constitution.
- 10. The Bill provides that the Parliament (Remuneration of Members) Act, Cap.259 (which provides for remuneration of Members of Parliament) shall not apply to any period in respect of which a person is paid any salary, allowances or benefits under the new Bill. The Bill also provides that section 3 of the Parliament (Remuneration of Members) Act, Cap. 259 shall continue to apply to a President or Vice President who ceased to hold that office before the commencement of the 1995 Constitution.
- 11. The Bill further seeks to repeal the Presidential Emolument and Benefits Act, Cap.263, but provides that the repeal does not prejudice anything to which a person was entitled under the repealed Act immediately before the commencement of the new Bill.
- 12. The Bill also confers on Parliament the power by resolution to amend the First to Thirteenth Schedules to the Bill.

A Bill for an Act

ENTITLED

THE EMOLUMENTS AND BENEFITS OF THE PRESIDENT, VICE PRESIDENT AND PRIME MINISTER ACT, 2009.

An Act to provide for the salaries, allowances and other benefits of a President, Vice President and Prime Minister in accordance with articles 106, 108 and 108A of the Constitution; to repeal and replace the Presidential Emoluments and Benefits Act, Cap. 263 and for other related matters.

BE IT ENACTED by Parliament as follows:

Interpretation.

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In this Act, unless the context otherwise requires—

"abuse of office" means doing or directing to be done an arbitrary act prejudicial to the interest of a public body or a company in which the Government has shares or abuse of authority of a persons' office;

"chauffer driven vehicle" means a four wheel vehicle driven by an official driver;

"child" means a person below the age of eighteen years and includes an adopted child:

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"extra judicial killing" means the killing of a human being not in accordance with the law:

"four wheel vehicle" means a vehicle with four axles;

"Minister" means the Minister responsible for public service;

"security guard" means a police officer assigned duties by the Inspector General of Police for purposes of guarding the person and residence of the former President, former Vice President and former Prime Minister as the case may be;

"spouse" means a wife or husband;

"subversive action" means an action or omission that is prejudicial to, or undermines the security of the State;

"vehicle" means—

- in case of a President, a 4000 to 5000 cc vehicle;
- (b) in case of a Vice President, a 3500 to 4000 cc vehicle; and
- in case of a Prime Minister, a 3000 to 3500 cc vehicle.

Salary, allowances and other benefits of the President.

The President shall be paid the salary and allowances and shall be afforded the other benefits specified in relation to the office of President in the First Schedule to this Act.

Salary, allowances and other benefits of the Vice President. The Vice President shall be paid the salary and allowances and shall be afforded the other benefits specified in relation to the office of Vice President in the Second Schedule to this Act.

4. Salary, allowances and other benefits of the Prime Minister. The Prime Minister shall be paid the salary and allowances and shall be afforded the other benefits specified in relation to the office of Prime Minister in the Third Schedule to this Act.

5. Benefits for a President ceasing to hold office.

- (1) A President who ceases to hold office otherwise than by being removed under article 107(1)(a) or (b) of the Constitution shall be granted the benefits specified in the Fourth Schedule to this Act.
- (2) A President to whom subsection (1) applies shall not qualify for a grant of benefits under that subsection—
 - (a) if he or she is convicted for subversive activities against Uganda or another country;
 - (b) if he or she is convicted for extra judicial killing;
 - (c) if he or she is convicted for a crime involving dishonesty or moral turpitude; or
 - (d) if he or she is convicted for stealing, money laundering, fraud or any similar unlawful activity.

6. Benefits of surviving spouse or spouses and dependent children of a President who dies in office.

The benefits specified in the Fifth Schedule to this Act shall be enjoyed together by the surviving spouse or spouses and dependent children of a President who dies while in office until the death of the spouse or spouses or in the case of the dependent children, until they attain the age of eighteen years or until they die, whichever is the earlier.

7. Benefits of surviving spouse or spouses and dependent children of a deceased retired President.

Emoluments and Benefits of the President,

The benefits specified in the Sixth Schedule to this Act shall be enjoyed together by the surviving spouse or spouses and dependent children of a President who dies in retirement until the death of the spouse or spouses or in the case of the dependent children, until they attain the age of eighteen years or until they die whichever is earlier.

8. Benefits for a Vice President ceasing to hold office.

- (1) A Vice President who ceases to hold office shall be granted the benefits specified in the Seventh Schedule to this Act.
- (2) A Vice President to whom subsection (1) applies shall not qualify for a grant of benefits under that subsection if he or she is removed from office on any of the following grounds—
 - (a) abuse of his or her office;
 - (b) misconduct or misbehaviour;
 - (c) conviction for subversive activities against Uganda or another country;
 - (d) conviction for extra judicial killing;
 - (e) conviction for a crime involving dishonesty or moral turpitude; or
 - (f) conviction for stealing, money laundering, fraud or any similar unlawful activity.

9. Benefits of surviving spouse or spouses and dependent children of a Vice President who dies in office.

The benefits specified in the Eighth Schedule to this Act, shall be enjoyed together by the surviving spouse or spouses and the dependent children of a Vice President who dies while in office until the death of the spouse or spouses or in the case of the dependent children, until they attain the age of eighteen years or until they die whichever is the earlier.

10. Benefits of surviving spouse or spouses of a deceased retired Vice President.

The benefits specified in the Ninth Schedule to this Act, shall be enjoyed together by the surviving spouse or spouses and dependent children of a Vice President who dies in retirement until the death of the spouse or spouses or in the case of the dependent children until they attain the age of eighteen years or until they die whichever is the earlier.

11. Benefits for a Prime Minister ceasing to hold office.

- (1) A Prime Minister who ceases to hold office shall be granted the benefits specified in the Tenth Schedule to this Act.
- (2) A Prime Minister to whom subsection (1) applies shall not qualify for a grant of benefits if he or she is removed from office on any of the following grounds—
 - (a) abuse of his or her office;
 - misconduct or misbehaviour;
 - conviction for subversive activities against Uganda or another country;
 - conviction for extra judicial killing;
 - conviction for a crime involving dishonesty or moral turpitude; or
 - conviction for stealing, money laundering, fraud or any similar unlawful activity.

12. Benefits of surviving spouse or spouses and dependent children of a Prime Minister who dies in office.

The benefits specified in the Eleventh Schedule to this Act, shall be enjoyed together by the surviving spouse or spouses and dependent children of a Prime Minister who dies while in office until the death of the spouse or spouses or in the case of the dependent children until they attain the age of eighteen years or until they die whichever is the earlier.

13. Benefits of surviving spouse or spouses and dependent children of a deceased retired Prime Minister.

Emoluments and Benefits of the President.

The benefits specified in the Twelfth Schedule to this Act, shall be enjoyed together by the surviving spouse or spouses and dependent children of a Prime Minister who dies in retirement until the death of the spouse or spouses or in the case of the dependent children, until they attain the age of eighteen years or until they die whichever is the earlier.

14. Funeral benefits of President.

Where a President dies while in office he or she shall be accorded a state funeral and he or she shall be accorded the benefits specified in the Thirteenth Schedule to this Act.

15. Funeral benefits of Vice President.

Where a Vice President dies while in office he or she shall be accorded a state funeral and he or she shall be accorded the benefits specified in the Thirteenth Schedule to this Act.

16. Funeral benefits of the Prime Minister.

Where a Prime Minister dies while in office he or she is entitled to an official funeral and shall be accorded the benefits specified in the Thirteenth Schedule to this Act.

17. Government's contribution towards funeral expenses.

Where a President, Vice President or Prime Minister dies while in office, the Government shall contribute thirty percent of the gross annual salary of the President, Vice President or Prime Minister towards the funeral expenses.

18. Funeral benefits of spouses.

Where a spouse of a President, Vice President or Prime Minister dies, the Government shall contribute thirty percent of the annual salary of the President, Vice President or Prime Minister whichever the case may be.

19. Vice President acting as President to enjoy benefits of President. Where a Vice President acts as a President for a period of six months or more, he or she shall qualify to enjoy the benefits of a President.

20. Revocation of appointment of Vice President or Prime Minister.

- (1) Where the President revokes the appointment of a Vice President or a Prime Minister, the Vice President or Prime Minister shall only enjoy the benefits under this Act upon retirement, even where they have been reassigned other Government duties.
- (2) Where the Vice President or Prime Minister, becomes a Member of Parliament, he or she shall benefit from the greater of the benefits, under this Act and those enjoyable by a Member of Parliament but not both.

21. Misconduct after retirement.

Where a retired President, Vice President or Prime Minister is serving a sentence of imprisonment the benefits they are enjoying shall be suspended until they serve their sentence.

22. Ownership of house.

The State shall for the purposes of the First and Fourth Schedules provide a house of appropriate quality, design and location, the ownership of which shall vest in Government.

23. Payment of benefits on resignation.

For the avoidance of doubt—

- (a) the benefits specified in Part B of the Fourth Schedule to this Act shall be payable in respect of a President who resigns from office.
- (b) the benefits specified in Part B of the Seventh Schedule to this Act shall be payable in respect of a Vice President who resigns from office.
- (c) the benefits specified in Part B of the Tenth Schedule to this Act shall be payable in respect of a Prime Minister who resigns from office.

(d) the benefits payable to a spouse or spouses and dependent children of a deceased retired President, deceased retired Vice President or deceased retired Prime Minister under this Act, shall respectively be payable to the spouse or spouses or dependent children of a deceased President, Vice President or a Prime Minister who ceases to hold office by resignation.

24. Vehicle maintenance.

Bill No. 1

The vehicles provided for under this Act, shall be procured, fuelled and maintained by the Government.

25. Expenses to be charged on Consolidated Fund.

The salaries, allowances and benefits granted under this Act shall be charged on the Consolidated Fund.

26. Five yearly review

The salaries, allowances and benefits granted under this Act, shall be reviewed every five years.

27. Disapplication of the Parliament (Remuneration of Members) Act.

- (1) The Parliament (Remuneration of Members) Act, shall not apply to any period in respect of which a person is paid or granted any salary, allowances or benefits under this Act.
- (2) Nothing in this section shall deprive a person of a right which has accrued to him or her under the Act referred to in subsection (1) in respect of any period before the application of this Act to that person.
- (3) Parliament may, by resolution, make such adjustments as may be necessary to accommodate any person who acts temporarily in the office of President, Vice President or Prime Minister to this Act.

28. Amendment of Schedules.

Parliament may, by resolution, amend the First, Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, Seventh, Eighth, Ninth, Tenth, Eleventh, Twelfth, and Thirteenth Schedules to this Act.

29. Application of the Parliament (Remuneration of Members) Act.

For the avoidance of doubt, section 3 of the Parliament (Remuneration of Members) Act shall continue to apply to a President or Vice President who ceased to hold that office before the commencement of the 1995 Constitution.

30. Application of sections 2, 3 and 4.

For the avoidance of doubt, sections 2, 3 and 4 of this Act, as the case may be, apply only to a President, Vice President and Prime Minister under the 1995 Constitution.

31. Repeal and transitional provision.

- (1) The Presidential Emoluments and Benefits Act is repealed.
- (2) Without prejudice to the Interpretation Act, the repeal of the Presidential Emoluments and Benefits Act shall not prejudice any right to which a person was entitled under that Act immediately before the commencement of this Act.

- 4. Government shall be fully represented at the funeral service and burial.
- 5. The body shall be transported in an official hearse to the point of the burial.
- 6. Official pall bearers shall carry the casket.
- 7. A seventeen gun salute.
